> (and being lazy), blue asters are now blooming
> like crazy where years ago we had only broomsedge grass. Of course the
> broomsedge is very pretty and golden this time of year.
> It's a shame to cut it, but in winter we will bush hog (mow) the pastures
> after the flowers fade and turn into seeds.
